

Long-time Strawn residents fondly recall memories of the depot, such as riding the passenger trains to other cities, picking up freight deliveries, and riding bikes on the depot ramp. Electric Rates are Simmering Public Notice & Friendly Reminder as Summer Heats Up!

With summer quickly approaching and temps getting hotter, it's an opportune time to check your electricity rates to make certain you're getting the best deal and cheapest rates available. Since the deregulation of electricity in Texas in 2002, Texans have had the choice to choose their electricity provider. To check the latest published rates and list of providers, go to www.powertochoose.org. You will be asked to enter your zip code (ex. 76475). You can further narrow your search by answering three questions concerning Usage, Types of Plans and duration. To make it easier, have your current electric bill and if possible, an electric bill from last summer available so that you can compare the kilowatt hours (kWh) used during peak usage and the rate you pay currently. In many electric plans, the rates will vary based on usage so read the plans carefully.
